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# Greetings from President Sly:



Have you already broken your New Year's Resolutions? I have not. However, keep in mind that I did not make any resolutions this year. I have read that the busiest month for gyms is January. By February almost every machine is available any time you go there.

The first part of November I was invited to join an AMBA Round-up in Austin TX. Because of SDRSP's new partnership with AMBA, South Dakota was represented for the first time. There is a wide variety of groups represented. One commonality is that each group's members are part of that state's retirement system. There were small states that may have only two units of retired school personnel. There were large states that have several groups represented such as retired firefighters, retired school personnel, retired state workers, etc. Some states have paid staff and many have volunteers like SD.

What I found is that South Dakota faces similar challenges as other states. As a result of this gathering, small membership state leaders are now meeting once a month via Zoom to discuss and share things that are working and not working. Jeff Kail with AMBA is helping organize and lead SD, WY, ID, MT, OR and NM as we work to increase new retiree membership and retain the current members.

One of the areas SDRSP could consider adjusting is membership requirements. Who can be a member of SDRSP? According to our by-laws, membership is open to any retired person formerly employed as a professional educator, administrator or support staff. In addition, the non-educator spouse of a member may also join.

Many other states have changed their by-laws to include associate members such as pre-retirees, others who support education, and even virtual members. In most states the language in the by-laws allow associate members to vote, but not hold elected office.

An example - One near-by state offered the administrators in the K-12 schools a free membership. That established a relationship with the district, which then provided more possibilities for access to pre-retirees in the districts. With AMBA benefits helping administrators, they began to realize the opportunities for their staff.

I am not saying SDRSP needs to do the same thing, but it is time to think outside of the usual way things have been done. For the whole state we have increased new members by under 30 this year. That is not a large enough number to cover the non-renewals and members who pass in a year's time.

Recently the SDRSP board members had a Zoom meeting. Rhonda is heading up a small committee to review our current by-laws. Everyone is open to suggestions. Any changes to the by-laws would be shared with the membership before the convention and voted on at the convention. Input is appreciated.

That company provided oversight for the SD Department of Education on how school districts spent federal money.

On September 19, the Dept. of Education held a public meeting in Sioux Falls to give the public an opportunity to express their opinions on the revised social Studies standards. Since the meeting was held on a school day, SDEA-Retired and Sioux Falls Retired School Personnel teachers picketed outside before the meeting and then attended the meeting to voice their concerns.

Teachers are concerned about several areas of the revised standards, especially since the revised standards were developed by a second committee with only two teachers on the committee. Other concerns include the age appropriateness of some standards for the lower grades and lack of higher-level thinking skills for the upper-level grades.
