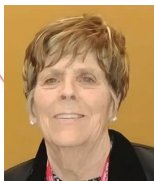
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A FALL MESSAGE

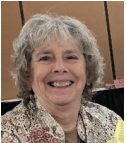

Scholarship Criteria

Purpose: To provide assistance for a veteran South Dakota teacher who is working on an advanced degree or national certification.

SCHOLARSHIP APPLICATION REQUIREMENTS

1. Applicant must be a current teacher in a South Dakota K-12 school.
2. Applicant must have at least 5 years of teaching experience.
3. All applications and recommendations must be submitted electronically to the following email address: vicki.sterling@dsu.edu
Questions can also be e-mailed to this address.
4. A \$1000 award for the scholarship winner will be sent to the recipient.
5. All applications must be received by April 5, 2026. The winners will be notified, and then announced at the SDRSP convention in May.

The application must include the following:

- Biographical Information
- Name
- Home Address
- Email address
- Current teaching position – grade and school
- Number of years applicant has taught
- Teaching history for the past 5 years
- Name of the institution/location the applicant plans to attend
- Planned course of study, including credits/hours

Teacher's response to the following questions (Not to exceed 500 words):

1. How will your planned course of study help you toward your advanced degree or national certification?
2. How will this educational opportunity impact your teaching?
3. Fellow Teacher's or Administrator's Recommendation (between 100 – 200 words)
4. What characteristics does the applicant display in the classroom that merits the awarding of this scholarship?

GRANDPARENT ESSAY CONTEST GUIDELINES

SUBJECT: “Why my grandparent should be the AARP SD Grandparent of the Year”
A grandparent is defined as any older adult who fulfills a grand parenting or “senior citizen mentor” role for a child. A familial relationship is not necessary in order to meet this requirement.

ELIGIBILITY: Contest is for 5th graders in public and private schools.

TECHNICAL REQUIREMENTS: Essay must be an original work of the author, up to 500 words in length, be written in English, and include the components of a formal essay, e.g., introduction, supporting points and conclusion. Essay must be submitted on white, 8” x 11” paper (standard size paper), and be legibly hand-written or typed by the author on one side only of the page. Only the WINNING essay from each school building is to be submitted to the local Retired School Personnel SDRSP contact, along with Form A. The author’s name and school must also be written at the end of the essay.

JUDGING CRITERIA & AWARDS: Qualifying characteristics: 60% Creativity and Expression 20% Grammar and Form 20% Neatness. Winning essays may be viewed by individual years on the website, www.sdrsp.org. Use the Grandparent Essay link.

DEADLINES: School winner’s deadline: February 1. The school winner is chosen by 5th grade teachers (or other appropriate judges) from the participating school based on the judging criteria provided. The winning essay from each school must be received by the local SDRSP unit contact by the deadline provided. Form A MUST be attached to the school winner’s essay.

UNIT WINNER’S DEADLINE: February 15 Judging for the unit winner will be among all the school winners in that unit’s area. The unit winner is chosen by representatives of the local SDRSP unit. Local units are encouraged to keep a copy of their unit’s winning essay so that their winner can be invited to read it at one of their meetings. The winning essay from each unit, along with Form B, must be completed and sent to the RSP Essay Committee Chairperson: Anita Manning, 719 N Shepherd Avenue, Sioux Falls SD 57103, email - manning310@midco.net, phone – 605-351-3112

REGIONAL JUDGING: March 1 The Sioux Falls RSP will do the regional judging for the essay contest. AARP Regions are Southeast, Northeast, and West. The three regional winning essays, chosen by the Sioux Falls RSP Essay Committee, will be submitted to the AARP South Dakota State Office by March 1.

STATE FINALS JUDGING: April 1 The AARP South Dakota office will establish a judging panel consisting of members of the AARP South Dakota Executive Council and the AARP South Dakota State Director.

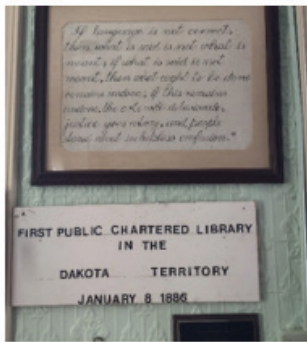

The Prairie Village Library was the first Chartered Library in Dakota Territory, January, 1886. It was first housed in a general store in Howard, S.D. Later it was moved to another site, shared with the city council, jail and the fire department. In 1972 the building was transferred to Prairie Village, where it currently resides. During Prairie Village Days, members of MARSP volunteer as hosts of the library and share

MARSP held their September 30th meeting at Peaceful Pines Retirement Center in Madison, which is the home of our guest speaker Bonnie Funk. We enjoyed a delicious hot beef sandwich lunch in the resident dining room after which Bonnie gave us a delightful talk on her mission of crocheting sleeping mats for the homeless who are served by Church on the Street (a non-profit in Sioux Falls designed to serve the homeless).

The mats are made with “plarn” which is Bonnie’s term for plastic yarn. Her daughter in California saw the instructions on how to make them on the internet and sent the pattern to Bonnie. The “plarn” is made from grocery bags which are folded and cut into strips and then tied together and crocheted. It’s a LOT of work to make one mat which requires 800 grocery bags. She demonstrated how to prep and tie the bags and then members got to try their hand at actually making strips. Bonnie says her project helps take some of the plastic out the landfill. She has a collection box

at the front entrance that people bring the bags to and, thanks to local press and volunteers saving bags, she is busy making mats for the homeless. Thank you for a fun and informative time!

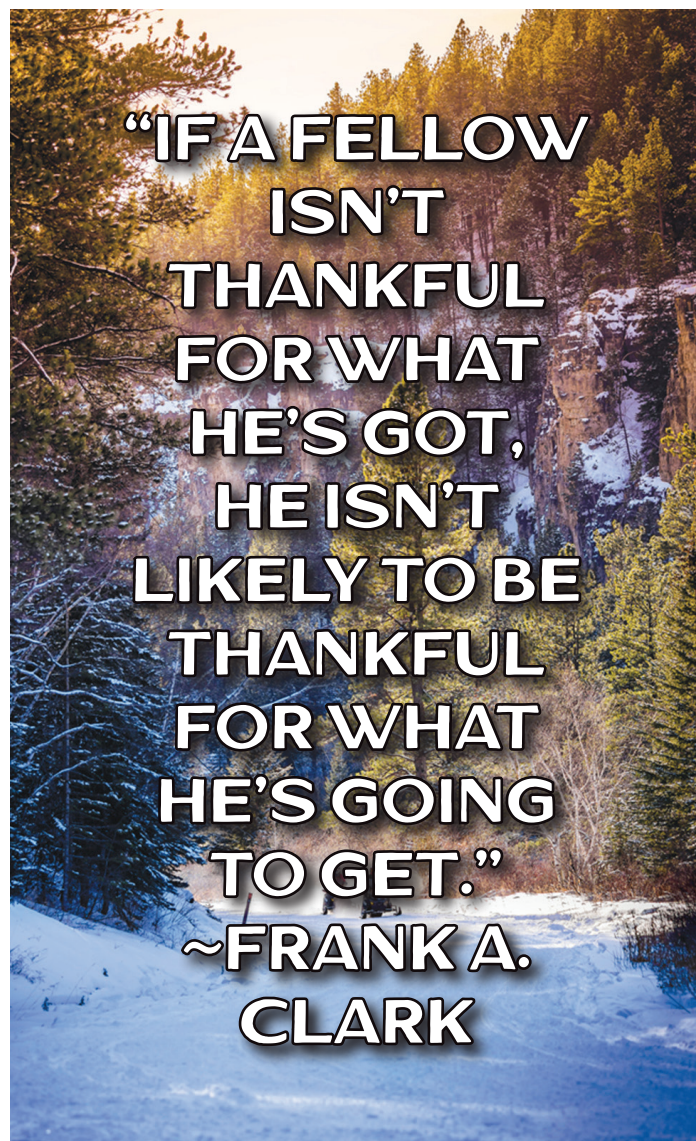
In September, WARSP member and school board president Jon Iverson hosted a tour of the new Allen R. Mitchell complex. What an awesome facility! We met Watertown's new city

Chocolate Raspberry Pie

This recipe came from my husband's mother. It is a holiday favorite. ~Jacque Sly

Raspberry layer:

3 tablespoons Sugar
1 tablespoon cornstarch
2 cups fresh or frozen unsweetened raspberries

Cook sugar and cornstarch with raspberries. Bring to boil over medium heat. Boil for 2 minutes. Remove from heat. Cool 15 minutes. Spread into baked pie shell (or graham cracker crust). Refrigerate.

Cream cheese filling:

8-ounce pkg softened cream cheese
1/3 cup sugar
1/2 teaspoon vanilla
1/2 cup cream, whipped (or Cool Whip)

In mixing bowl, combine cream cheese, sugar and vanilla till fluffy. Fold in whipped cream. Spread on raspberry layer. Refrigerate at least 1 hour.

Topping:

1/2 cup chocolate chips
3 tablespoons butter

Melt chocolate and butter together. Pour over filling. Chill at least 2 hours before serving. (Serving hint: dip sharp knife in hot water first to help when cutting through chocolate topping.)

CHECK MEMBERSHIP ADDRESSES!

It is important for all unit officers to check with each member for their correct address.

Not having correct addresses costs the organization a great deal of money.
